Skilled Trades Information

We are dedicating this week's information section to skilled trades. Here are some reasons why you may wish to learn more about opportunities in the skilled trades:

- There are <u>144 Skilled Trades</u> in Ontario in four different sectors: Motive Power, Service, Construction, and Industrial
- 40% of Canada's workforce is in skilled trades
- The will be an estimated shortage of 1.2 million workers in the skilled trades by the end of 2025
- Salaries in the skilled trades are increasing. There are many well-paying jobs in skilled trades, often including benefits and pensions
- Post-secondary education is not linear—people often enter skilled trades after college or university

How To Get Started in the Skilled Trades

• Take courses in Technologies (or other areas leading to your chosen skilled trade) to develop skills that apply to skilled trades

• Take co-op courses to test out career pathways, gain real-world experience and form relationships with potential employers

• Leverage co-op experience and relationships to explore an apprenticeship opportunity OR apply to a college program where you will develop skills and be connected with an employer
