### 2025-2026 Draft School Year Calendars

### **Recommendation:**

That the Draft 2025-2026 School Year Calendars be approved for submission to the Ministry of Education.

### **Background:**

The 2025-26 School Year Calendars (Appendix A and B) are prepared in consultation with the School Year Calendar Advisory Committee, the public, the co-terminus school board, and neighbouring school boards, and are endorsed by Executive Council. The calendars meet all Ministry requirements. Specifically, the calendars comply with Ontario Regulation 304, School Year Calendars, and Professional Activity (PA) Days.

O. Reg. 304, School Year Calendar, Professional Activity (PA) Days sets the requirements for preparation and submission of school year calendars to the Ministry. This includes a minimum of 194 school days between September 1 and June 30. In addition, Boards may designate up to seven (7) PA days and up to ten (10) examination days which leaves 187 instructional days.

O. Reg 304 (4) also establishes holidays for the school year. The following chart outlines the holidays for the 2025-2026 school year aligned with this regulation.

The School Year Calendar Advisory Committee met on October 1<sup>st</sup>, November 4<sup>th</sup>, 2024, and January 30<sup>th</sup>, 2025, to review and provide feedback for consideration in the development of the 2025-2026 School Year Calendar. The School Year Calendar Advisory Committee consists of members representing: Elementary and Secondary Principals (HWPC); Elementary and Secondary Teachers (HWETL, OSSTF, HWOTL), English as a Second Language Instructors (ESL); Parents (Parent Involvement Committee, Home & School Association); Educational Assistants, Child and Youth Practitioners (COPE), Early Childhood Educators (HWDECEL), School Office and Technical Workers (OCTU), Maintenance and Caretaking staff (CUPE) and Professional Student Services Personnel (PSSP).

As directed by the Board of Trustees, public consultation took place from December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2024, and January 13<sup>th</sup>, 2025, to receive community feedback regarding the draft calendars. The consultation involved both an online survey as well as the EngageHWDSB online platform. To support visibility and participation, the survey was promoted through the Student Senate, School Councils, and the Parent Involvement Committee; individual schools were also asked to promote the consultation in school newsletters. A School Messenger notification was sent to all families regarding the consultation.

The Draft 2025-2026 Elementary School Year Calendar has been updated to reflect current updates regarding the Provincial election.

### **Consultation Report**

During the consultation period, 1700 individuals visited the EngageHWDSB consultation site. In total, 956 responses were received from parents/guardians/ caregivers (94%), HWDSB employees (5%), students (1%) and the community (<1%). The results were compiled by the HWDSB Research & Analytics Department and are available for review (Appendix C).

Overall, there was support for the proposed draft calendar. Most respondents indicated they prefer a Professional Activity Day (PA Day) on the first day of school.

#### **Financial Implications**

There is an additional cost to the HWDSB when Professional Activity Days differ between coterminus school boards. Consultation between co-terminus boards occurs to align as many Professional Activity Days as possible.

For the 2025/2026 school year, Professional Activity days are aligned <u>except</u>: Wednesday January 28<sup>th</sup> (Secondary only), Wednesday June 24<sup>th</sup> (Secondary only), Friday June 26<sup>th</sup> (both Elementary and Secondary). The cost of these unaligned days is approximately \$50,000 for the 2025/2026 school year.

### Professional Activity (PA) Days:

School boards must dedicate three (3) PA days to provincial education priorities and may provide up to four (4) additional PA days per school year.

Dates for Professional Activity (PA) days have been determined to prioritize timely professional learning opportunities that adhere to provincial requirements, including the completion of any required programs and legislated training.

For the 2025-26 school year, the Ministry of Education has not yet provided information regarding the topics for the required Ministry priority Professional Activity Days. We anticipate receiving further information this spring.

PA days will also focus on learning related to school improvement. Educators will engage in professional learning at the beginning, middle and end of the school year to review student data, complete reporting, identify student needs and skill gaps, as well as plan for purposeful instruction to address these needs. Continued learning about human rights, anti-racism, anti-oppression and Indigenous Education will be integrated across all professional learning.

The remaining school days shall be instructional days. The boards may designate up to ten instructional days as examination days

### **Purpose of Consultation**

Every year, school boards across Ontario must submit school year calendars to the Ministry of Education for approval. According to Regulation 304, school board calendars for elementary and secondary schools must include 194 school days (including up to seven Professional Activity Days) between September 1 and June 30, with up to 10 days designated as examination days for secondary schools.

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) asked members of the public to comment on the Draft 2025-2026 School Year Elementary and Secondary Calendars through the completion of an online survey and the EngageHWDSB platform. The consultation ran from December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2024, until January 13<sup>th</sup>, 2025, and garnered a total of 962 responses. The survey asked respondents:

- a) whether or not they agree with the proposed dates in the elementary and secondary calendars, and
- b) to comment on each of the key dates.

The EngageHWDSB calendar project was visited by approximately 1,700 people. On the site, visitors were able to access draft versions of the elementary and secondary calendars, and to provide additional feedback on the proposed dates. The calendars were downloaded 601 times (elementary: 437; secondary: 164).

### **Respondent Characteristics**

The largest number of responses came from parents/guardians (n = 902, 94%), while 5% (n = 44) identified themselves as HWDSB staff members, 1% (n = 9) came from HWDSB students, and less than 1% (n = 3) came from community groups/members.

919 respondents (97% of those who answered) indicated they had children attending an HWDSB school, whereas 27 responses (3%) were from respondents who indicated they did not have children in an HWDSB school. 16 respondents did not provide an answer to this question.

When asked which calendar they would like to provide feedback on, 76% (n = 731) indicated elementary. 24% (n = 225) indicated secondary.

Of note, the demographic makeup of respondents has shifted dramatically over the past four years. Whereas in the consultations for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 calendars the number of respondents who identified themselves as HWDSB staff was over 30% (31% and 44% respectively), that number dropped to 9% for the 2024-2025 consultation, and dropped further this year – to 5%.

The number of respondents for this year's consultation also dropped significantly from last year's highwater mark of over 2300 but returned to a level similar to prior years.



### **Summary of Findings**

In keeping with principles of equality, equity, and non-discrimination, we have examined the consultation responses through an equity lens. From this perspective, our findings elevate voices that might otherwise be overwhelmed by a statistical majority.

### **Elementary**

Members of the public were invited to indicate whether they agreed or disagreed with key dates in the draft Elementary School Year Calendar. The following is a summary of the feedback:

### **Elementary Calendar Comments**

Members of the public were further invited to offer comments regarding each of the key dates in the Elementary Calendar.

The proposed **Start Date (September 2)** for students generated considerable feedback. Although most respondents agreed with the proposed date, of the minority (21%) in disagreement, most wanted to see the start date pushed later, with many suggesting that it would ease the transition back to school.

There are similarities between the comments relating to the proposed elementary start date and **PA Day 1 (September 19)**. While a majority of respondents agreed with these two dates, many in disagreement suggested September 3<sup>rd</sup> should be the start date, wishing to move PA Day 1 to September 2<sup>nd</sup>. Respondents cited that moving PA Day 1 before the first day of school would allow staff to prepare. Numerous other respondents disagreeing with the proposed scheduling of PA Day 1 argued that it is too early in the school year, and that it would be disruptive rather than beneficial. Some suggested moving the day adjacent to Thanksgiving or to use it later for school reorganization.

There is an interesting point of comparison between reactions to the proposed elementary start date from this year and last. Last year, while also a minority of the total respondents, those who indicated that they disagreed with the proposed start date (the day after a PA Day) were mainly concerned with childcare and difficulties for working parents. Similarly, numerous respondents this year voiced their approval for the September 2025 start date, citing that it is easier on families not to begin the year with a PA Day.

The Ministry of Education recommended the placement of PA Day 2 (October 20) and PA Day 6 (June 6) due to the possibility of elections being held on those dates. Roughly three quarters of respondents (74%) agreed with the proposed scheduling, but both dates received common criticism. The most frequently occurring comments regarding both dates maintain that PA Days should be consistently scheduled on Fridays, with many respondents highlighting scheduling and childcare difficulties faced by families.

The second most frequently occurring opinion regarding **PA Day 2** holds that its proposed placement is too close to Thanksgiving, creating two short weeks for students and childcare concerns for families. Numerous other respondents commented that they would like PA Day 2 to be attached to the Thanksgiving weekend to extend the break, while others suggested an October/November PA day should fall the day after Halloween. Additional comments regarding **PA Day 6** argued that its placement is too close to the end of the year or that there are too many PA days in June. Of note, some respondents cast doubt on the probability elections would be called for on the dates put forward by the Ministry and questioned whether the PA days would be rescheduled.

PA Days 3 (November 21) and 4 (January 23) had high approval ratings (97% and 94% respectively) and garnered the least number of respondent comments. Some respondents commenting on student progress reports expressed a desire that



they be completed earlier in the year and that there be options for families to attend teacher interviews – in the evening or online. The most frequent comments relating to PA Day 4 argue that its proposed placement follows too closely after the Winter Break.

Comments on the proposed date for PA Day 5 (March 6) were mixed. Numerous respondents commented that they would like to see the PA day attached to March Break, with others suggesting it be adjacent to Family Day; however, many more respondents argued that a PA day should not be scheduled close to March Break.

Like PA Day 1 and the elementary Start Date, comments relating to PA Day 7 (June 26) and the proposed elementary End Date (June 25) were related. Reaction to both proposed dates was largely supportive (89% or higher); however, a main point of feedback was that the school year should end on June 26th so students can attend until the end of the week. Multiple parents commented that moving the PA day to the following week would make childcare arrangements and planning easier.

### Secondary

Members of the public were invited to indicate whether they agreed or disagreed with key dates in the draft Secondary School Year Calendar. The following is a summary of the feedback:


### **Secondary Calendar Comments**

In keeping with the trend from prior years, response numbers for the Secondary Calendar were considerably lower than those for the Elementary Calendar; however, there were some commonalities.

Although a minority of total respondents, of those commenting on the **Semester 1 Start Date (September 2)**, nearly half wanted the school year to begin on September 3<sup>rd</sup> for students, with many suggesting that **PA Day 1 (September 19)** be scheduled before the first day of classes to ease the transition. Others, not specifically referring to a PA day before the first day, maintained that the start date is too early. Of respondents commenting directly on the proposed scheduling of the September 19<sup>th</sup> PA day, nearly half remarked that the timing is too early in the year – that students will have just returned to classes.

Similar to comments on the Elementary Calendar, some respondents commenting on PA Day 2 (October 20) argued that the proposed date is too close to Thanksgiving, with a small number suggesting an October/November PA day should be scheduled for the day after Halloween. Like comments on the Elementary Calendar, some respondents cast doubt on the probability an election would be called for on the date put forward by the Ministry and questioned whether the PA day would be rescheduled. A small number suggested that schools not be used as polling sites.

The remaining Semester 1 dates (Semester 1 End Date, Semester 1 Exam Days, PA Day 3, PA Day 4) received high approval levels – near or above 90%. The majority of those commenting on the end date held that Semester 1 should end on January 30<sup>th</sup> to complete the week, with some suggesting the proposed end date will be a waste of an instructional day. A small number of respondents suggested that the Semester 1 exams all be scheduled in one week, or positioned two before the weekend, and two after.





The proposed placement of **PA Day 4 (January 28)** was approved by 86% of respondents; however, of those who provided feedback, a majority commented that it should be scheduled on the Friday of the week so that students could have a Monday start for Semester 2. These comments correlate with respondent criticism of the proposed **Semester 2 Start Date for Students (January 30)**. Ninety-five percent of respondents who commented on the Semester 2 start date questioned the logic of the Friday date and/or suggested that the semester start on the Monday.

There was not a considerable amount of feedback on Semester 2 dates apart from the Start Date and **PA Day 5 (March 6)**, which garnered a mixed response. Some respondents suggested placing PA day 5 adjacent to March Break, while a smaller number argued that the proposed scheduling is too close to the break.

A relatively small number of respondents commented on PA Days 6 (June 24) and 7 (June 26), and the Semester 2 End Date for Students (June 25); however, the comments were related. Respondents expressed confusion about the purpose and timing of PA Day 6 and why/whether students would attend school on the 25<sup>th</sup> if an instructional day were to fall between two PA days.

#### **Additional Comments**

Finally, the public was invited to enter general comments about the draft Elementary and Secondary calendars. There are several points of overlap between the most frequently addressed topics in the open-ended comments and the responses to the individual dates above. This feedback again was mixed. Respondents addressed the school start date for students and advocated for the consistent scheduling of PA days (on Fridays); some suggested creating a more balanced calendar and spreading PA days out more evenly; others would like to see PA days adjacent to other holidays/breaks.

Respondents also used this opportunity to bring up concerns not covered previously in the questions we posed. Multiple individuals used the open-ended responses to indicate their support for the proposed calendars. Some respondents wanted to see the elementary and secondary calendars aligned so PA days fall on the same days across the Board, or be aligned with other school boards. Respondents also suggested that PA days be coordinated with community resources and childcare provider training days to help ensure childcare coverage for families. Numerous respondents commented that the calendar should consider and align with prominent non-Christian holidays and days of significance to be inclusive of students and staff.

Linking calendar planning with daily schedules, a number of respondents commented on daily start times for secondary schools arguing that students would benefit from later bell times. With respect to school processes, some respondents suggested that school re-organization falls too late in the school year and that student success planning should also occur earlier. A number of other respondents argued that the school year should not be shortened with PA days and/or that the number of scheduled PA days is excessive.





#### Conclusion

As in past years, the dates proposed in the draft calendars were supported by a majority of respondents but produced mixed feedback from those commenting on the specific dates. As examples, the student start date draws criticism depending on its placement – some parents object to a mid-week start because of childcare concerns, while others favour an early PA day to ease the transition back to school. We also see mixed responses regarding the secondary start date for Semester 2 and placing PA days in months with other breaks/holidays. Families citing childcare concerns prefer placing PA days away from other school breaks, while others would welcome extended breaks by attaching PA days to long weekends and March Break etc. The Ministry of Education's suggested placement of two PA days to accommodate possible elections was unique this year, with may respondents commenting that PA days should be scheduled on Fridays. Of note, at the time of writing, it appears likely that an Ontario election will be called on January 29<sup>th</sup>, which would change considerations regarding the dates suggested by the Ministry.
